Kilbeggan—Dublin. For the final time, we make our farewells to Tullamore and take to the road once more. As we make our return to Dublin, we come to Kilbeggan (from Cill Bheagáin, "the church of St Bécán"). Once there, we visit the Kilbeggan Distillery—the oldest licensed distillery of its kind in Ireland. Founded in 1757, our second distillery spent the next 200 years making a whiskey beloved the world over. When tough times ground its gears to a halt, the town came together to save the whiskey that built the town Afterwards, we have lunch and make our way to Ireland's 1,000-year-old city of Dublin. Once we arrive, we return to the Camden Court Hotel to check in, and then the rest of the afternoon is at your leisure. But don't wander too far afoot as we reconvene at the hotel in the late-afternoon for our second Whiskey Tasting, and then you're free to check out the Dublin dinner-scene and night-life Dinner is on your own.
